
Psychology A Level Bridging tasks

ESSENTIAL TASKS FOR FIRST LESSON BACK:

1. <u>Researching Psychological Approaches.</u>

We look at six key approaches to understanding human behaviour. Psychodynamic, Humanistic, Behaviourism, Social Learning Theory, Cognitive and Biopsychology. Research each of the six approaches and create:



- a) Brief summary (1 or 2 paragraphs) of the history and key principles for each approach
- b) Brief outline of at least one key research study associated with the approach (1 or 2 paragraphs)

2. Apply the approaches to a celebrity or character

Choose a celebrity or fictional character with interesting behaviours and under the headings Psychodynamic, Humanistic, Behaviourism, Social Learning Theory, Cognitive and Biopsychology explain their behaviour. <u>Create a poster</u> with this information and a brief profile of your person.

For example, you could choose Amy Winehouse and discuss how her drug and alcohol addiction was due to her imitating her friends (social learning theory) or it could be due to the impact of drugs on certain brain areas (biopsychology). Or you could choose a character like the Joker from batman and suggest his behaviour is due to negative thought patterns (cognitive) or repressed trauma from when he was a child (psychodynamic).
