University: Widening Participation (some of the criteria universities use to assess eligibility are: household income, receipt of free-school meals/sixth form bursary, first generation in a family to attend university and living in an area with low progression rates to university). Schemes often result in students receiving a slightly lower offer from the university.

Nuffield Research Placements – STEM Learning

Applications are now open for Nuffield Research Placements, which will take place during the summer holidays of 2023. Each placement lasts for two weeks and successful applicants will also complete a piece of research. Placements are available in all universities in the region as well as some businesses. Placements are available in astronomy/astrophysics, biochemistry, biology, biomedical sciences, chemistry, computing, earth sciences, engineering/manufacturing, environmental, forensic, geography, mathematics, physics, psychology, social sciences, statistics/data science.

Eligibility criteria include that you must:

- be over 16 years old and in Year 12
- be in full-time, state-funded education in the UK have at least 5 GCSEs at Level 6 or above, including maths, a science subject and English (or another humanities subject)
- be studying one or more A-levels (or equivalent) in science, technology, engineering, economics, geography, psychology, computing, statistics or maths
- be available for a few consecutive weeks over July and/or August to collaborate with your Project Supervisor.

Students must also meet at least **one** of the following conditions:

- be living, or have lived, in local authority care
- come from a family with a combined household income of below £30,000 a year
- be entitled to free school meals, either now or at any time in the last six years
- be entitled to discretionary payments from school or college
- be the first in your immediate family to participate in higher education (not including any older siblings):
 - this means that neither of your parents/carers have participated in higher education, either in the UK or another country
 - if your siblings have attended higher education, but your parents/carers have not, you are still eligible.

Apprentice Fork Truck Engineer - Linde Material Handling (UK) Limited

What will the apprentice be doing?

Over the 3-year period of the apprenticeship, there will be a steady progression of type of workload that will be offered. In year one, you will learn the basics about health and safety, mechanics, hydraulics, electrics and electronics. Much of this will be completed in one of our UK workshops, or on a resident site with one of our field-based engineers.

Over the next two years, you will gain access to more and more advanced portfolio of equipment, with the emphasis on making sure you are ready to pass out as a Linde Engineer at the end of your 3rd year. There are various different types of truck to work on -

- Internal combustion
- Electric Trucks using Lithium Ion
- Hydrogen and LPG.

London Med – Summer School (online)

Applications for the free **online** London Med Schools Summer Programme 2023 are now open. This programme is for Year 12 students living in England (outside of Greater London), who have only attended non-selective state schools since age 11 and are currently studying A-level biology and chemistry. Funded by Health Education England, the London Med Schools Summer Programme brings together four of London's medical schools (King's College London, Queen Mary University of London, St George's University of London, and University College London) to give 75 Year 12 students from across England an opportunity to find out what it is like to study medicine in London. Working with patients and student ambassadors, participants will gain a greater understanding of the realities of being a doctor and the skills needed to succeed.

The main summer school programme takes place from Monday 17th July to Friday 21st July on Zoom. There will also be additional events delivered in conjunction with the summer school which are detailed on the application form
