Channel Talent Talks

Neuroscience: The Human Brain in 5 Recent Discoveries - January 17 – UEA

On January 17th, William Penny, Professor in Psychology in the School of Psychology at University of East Anglia, will run an interactive talk for students entitled A Tour of the Human Brain in 5 Recent Discoveries. Will will explore recent advances in human brain science including the relationship between specialised neurons ("grid cells") and relational thinking, how representations of events experienced during the day are replayed at high speed during sleep (to help us learn), how similar processes also take place during quiet wakefulness, how clinical trials of psychedelic medication combined with psychotherapy are effective in the treatment of post-traumatic stress disorder, and how advances in artificial intelligence are helping us understand how different brain systems (language and vision) might work.

This is a great opportunity for Biology and Psychology students to find out about current research and the major advances we are making in this field.

EPQ/Sociology/Psychology: Research Methods - January 17 – Southampton

Katrina Lueddeke is the Academic Skills Manager for the *Learn with US Transition programme* at University of Southampton and joins us on 17th January to lead a skills workshop on Research Methods. Katrina will provide an interactive overview of different research methods which can be used to collect and evaluate primary and/or secondary sources. We will look at primary and secondary approaches to research, evaluating qualitative and quantitative data, and will explore techniques for collecting data (self-reports, observations, experiments).

This session will particularly benefit students who are studying qualifications such as the EPQ, Sociology and Psychology.

Biology/Anaesthetics: Blood & Gas Exchange – UEA - January 22

Tom Shand, a Clinical Educator for Operating Department Practice at UEA, will consider the anatomy of the airway and gas exchange and demonstrate how we breathe for patients under anaesthetic. Tom will then look at blood and how surgery affects its composition, considering "blood gases", haemoglobin levels, oxygen delivery and PH levels in blood during surgery and maintaining homeostasis to keep the patient safe.

Carried out in the university simulation centre, this session on January 22nd offers insight into real world applications of students' current curricula and illustrates how, in the future, they may use this knowledge to save lives.

How do I book?

Sutton Trust Summer School - Durham

Durham University's Sutton Trust Summer School is designed to give bright students from under-represented backgrounds the chance to experience what it is like to be a student at a leading university.

The summer school is a fantastic opportunity to find out more about applying to university, to meet some of the current students and work with one of the 25 academic departments. Durham is one of the <u>Sutton Trust</u>'s partner institutions, and as such, students will have access to support and resources from the Sutton Trust too, including the Sutton Trust Online platform and the Alumni network. This programme is available for Year 12 students from UK state-maintained schools.

Applications are open until 12.00pm (GMT) on **Thursday 7 March 2024**. Applications are made through the Sutton Trust's online application form.

You may apply to a UK Summer School if you:

- Are studying in Year 12 in England or Wales, Year 13 in Northern Ireland, or S5 in Scotland (or equivalent)
- Attend, and have always attended, a state-funded school or college (non-fee paying) in the UK

If you meet the above requirements, they will look at the following criteria when considering your application:

- Have achieved at least five GCSEs at grades 9 6 (A*-B), including English and Maths. A minimum of two
 of these qualifications should be at grades 9 7. Or five A or B grades at National 5 including one A
- Would be in the first generation of your family to attend university
- Have been in receipt of Free School Meals whilst at secondary school
- Attend a school or college with a below-average A-level or Higher point score and/or a low rate of progression to higher education
- Live in a neighbourhood with a low rate of progression to higher education and/or a high level of socioeconomic deprivation
- Have been looked after or in care

The more criteria you meet, the more likely you are to secure a place. Not meeting all of these will not disqualify you.

There is room on the application form and teacher verification to explain any extenuating circumstances that might impact your application.

If you are (or have been) looked after, accommodated or in care, you only need to meet the age, school and academic requirements.
